Report at April '19 Regular Meeting

From executive Board Meeting

Jobs bid in the last two weeks include: Saint Lawrence Seaway – Hands Free Mooring Snell Lock Dow(NU) for \$544,000, Heuvelton CSD Phase 2 went to TEL Inc (U) \$74,740, Northline Utilities(U) is low bidder on the New York State Olympic Regional Development Authority 1980 Ice Rink lighting and the Sliding Sports Facility Upgrades, Paul Smiths- Auditorium Renovation was GC bid to Luck Brothers who we are told is subbing the electric to ACE(NU), and Town of Ticonderoga – Baldwin Road Filter Plant was a GC bid to Reale Construction, who we are told will sub electric to Weydman(U).

Upcoming work includes: Fort Drum Exterior LED lighting, Crown Point Central School-Auditorium Renovation, Champlain Border-A/V Upgrades, , Fort Drum ECIP, SUNY Potsdam-Student Union, River Hospital Renovations, City of Ogdensburg – East River Pump Station Rehabilitation, Robert Moses State Park-Admin Facilities, NYS ORDA-Luge Sliding Sports Facility, Paul Smiths- Auditorium Renovation, Casino Island-Rebid, Heuvelton CSD Phase 2, Fort Drum Museum, ORDA-Rink Lighting Upgrades, Malone OGS Cold Storage Building, Lake Placid School, Carthage Hospital, Agri-Mark's Chateaugay facility, as well as the Number Three, Deer River and the Mad River wind farms.

School projects that are in various stages of development: Peru \$2.8 million, Franklin-Essex-Hamilton BOCES \$18.5 million, General Brown \$9.37 million, Parishville-Hopkinton \$2.3 million, St. Lawrence Central \$17.7 million, Brushton-Moira \$11.5 million, Jeff-Lewis BOCES \$20 million, St Lawrence-Lewis BOCES \$43.5 million, Beaver River \$12 million, and Indian River \$3.5 million.

Everyone is still anxiously awaiting the arrival of spring and the construction projects that will start up with the warmer weather.

The Ogdensburg Waste Water Treatment plant PLA has been signed by all the trades and should be voted upon at the April 8th City Council meeting. There has been a change in one Council seat, but the new appointee is the President of the Correctional Officers Union so we are assuming he will be on board. I would like to get members who live in Ogdensburg to attend the meeting next Monday.

The New York State budget was settled on time again on Sunday with a flurry of activity over the weekend. The push for a definition of Public Work by using the Bronson Bill, that passed this Legislative session, did not make it into the budget. This bill would result in more State-funded projects falling under the prevailing rate laws. I think the opposition by minority groups in New York City is what killed it. Those opposed say that it would harm non-union minority contractors. In my opinion, it would help those minority workers make more money. I don't think the minority contractors want a level playing field with Union Contractors.

Last week I attended a Business Managers meeting and an Association of Electrical Workers meeting in Albany. The State budget was discussed along with many new developments with the power grid in New York State.
