Borders Without Electricians



Members Travis Flint, Andy Timmermann and Bill Bailey spent 2 weeks volunteering for the Light Up Navajo project.

There are over 13,000 Navajo homes without electricity, which represents 1/3 of homes on the reservation and more than 75% of all homes in the USA that are not connected.

This is nearly a billion-dollar problem and alone could take the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) 50 years to connect everyone.

Since 2019 several linemen crews have volunteered to assist NTUA in bringing electricity to communities in a program called "Light Up Navajo" - bringing power lines in reach of nearly a thousand homes. However, most Navajo homes have no inside wiring. So, in the fall of 2024 several crews of volunteer wiremen began house wiring, complementing Light Up Navajo.

Business Manager's Report:

Currently we have 39 Journeyman on Book I, 3 on Book II, 0 Apprentices, 5 CE/CW's and 1 Tele-data technicians available for work.

I reached out to one of the companies proposing a Data Center in Massena offering help gaining public support for their project. They have met quite a bit of resistance lately from various groups opposing data centers. I am hoping to get a commitment from them to use union labor in exchange for our support of this project.

I was made aware of a complaint filed in the Northern District of New York by the AGC and a number of trade associations challenging N.Y. Labor Law Section 220(3)(f). This is the offsite fabrication bill that we worked to pass and is scheduled to go into effect on June 18, 2026. The Plaintiffs are seeking a temporary restraining order to prevent enforcement of the bill. This Bill requires the prevailing wage to be paid for workers pre-fabricating items to be installed on prevailing rate projects.

I have been in Arizona for the last two weeks for the Light Up Navajo Project with Electricians Without Borders. I want to thank Andrew Timmerman and William Bailey for joining me, it was a good experience, and we were glad to contribute.
